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Topic: "The Situation of Israel-Palestine"

The General Assembly Human Rights Council,

Acknowledging the situation between Israel and Palestine which has been occurring for over 70 years, deeply regretting the number of lives lost, fully aware of the lack of successful peacekeeping, emphasizing that a two state solution will cause less violence than if the two nations shared one state, supporting the Palestinian refugees to get education and basic needs such as, but not limited to, keeping in mind that both states will receive equal amounts of land based on population,

- 1. Considers Jerusalem an International territory;
- 2. Calls upon various NGOs to help improve the stability and safety in Palestine;
- 3. Encourages a resumption of negotiations between the international community, Palestine, and Israel;
- 4. Strives for an increase in economic relationships for Palestine;
- 5. Urges that military forces be extracted from Israeli and Palestinian land;
- 6. Recommends that Israel and Palestine, as well as the Security Council, meet and discuss and hopefully agree to the terms of a two-state solution;
- 7. Emphasizes the need for urgent humanitarian assistance for both Israeli and Palestinian refugees;
- 8. Calls upon intensified effort by the international community, the Security Council and the Quartet, to achieve a ceasefire and address the current political and humanitarian crisis, including the facilitation of humanitarian relief in Gaza;
- 9. Recognizes the need to stabilize Palestine by creating a cease fire;

- 10. Considering the recognition of the destruction that the war has caused the UN recommends the destruction of the wall;
- 11. Further recommends implementing two states once both Israel and Palestine have stabilized;
- 12. Further proclaims that Hamas needs to stand down as a ruling government and stop air strikes.
