Topic: Intellectual Property Rights

<u>Noting</u> with satisfaction the steps that have been taken to improve intellectual property (IP) laws and standards,

Alarmed by the increase in IP theft in both developed and developing nations,

<u>Aware of</u> the necessity of the ability to have intellectual standards to encourage inventor's creativity,

<u>Deeply concerned</u> that if IP is not respected, inventors won't create anything new for the fear of having their inventions stolen,

Emphasizing the importance of inventors and innovation for developing and fast growing economies,

Believing that with the right people IP can be fully protected,

Affirming our principled stand for the strengthening of IP laws and standards,

Stressing the fact that some countries are not respecting IP rights,

- 1. Calls upon the creation of a court that can deal with intellectual property theft and essential procedures with any discrepancies;
 - This court will have the ability to fine people or organization found guilty of IP violations for 110% of the profits they make of the theft, up to 6 months in prison, or 6 months of expulsion from their business;
 - Designates a section of this said court to deal with companies who decide to steal intellectual property;
- Declares accordingly that a small task force can be designated to dissuade countries from copying intellectual property;
- 3. There will be a treaty of intellectual property rights known as the World Intellectual Property Treaty, or the WIPT;
 - This treaty shalt be overseen by a committee of WIPO known as the WIPT Committee, or WIPTC;
 - ii. This committee shall consist of all signatories to the WIPT;
 - iii. WIPTC shall meet every 10 years to update this treaty;
 - iv. All facets of intellectual property be named "IP";
 - v. All IP protection shall apply on the Internet and in cyberspace;

- vi. All IP registered by one signatory to WIPT shall be recognized and enforced by all other signatories;
- 4. Proposes that booths for taking videos of original ideas be established, which would be distributed by a discreet conduit;
 - In addition to the video, a description could be sent with the video to assure that every aspect of the intellectual property would be covered;
 - ii. Said booth be present in malls, universities/colleges, government buildings, post offices;
 - iii. Any intellectual property too big to fit in said booth can be filmed outside and uploaded via secure USB link;
 - iv. Sending a video would require choosing a "package," these packages would consist of sending the video to 1 intellectual property office for \$1, sending the video to 2 intellectual property offices for \$2, and so on, the price would be exchangeable between different currencies;
 - v. This booth can be made of magnetized soundproof material encased in antimagnetic material, and that the safes would be made out of a very strong metal for the protection of the data;
- 5. Recommends the use of "patent cards," which are electronic cards given to inventors with their inventions on the cards; and
- 6. Negotiate treaties with countries who are not respecting intellectual property.
