Topic: Universal Primary Education

The General Assembly, keeping in mind that in the year 2000 the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) were established by world leaders. The goal of the MDGs was to make sure that all children of both genders, in every country, are enrolled and going to school,

Congratulates that the number of out of school children has reduced from 100,000,000 to 58,000,000 between 2000 and 2012,

Fully aware that UNICEF is currently working with governments and NGOs to let boys and girls have equal rights for learning,

Declaring that children ages five through nine should get primary education,

1. Calls upon sending older educated people to teach younger children basic skills such as reading, writing, and mathematics;
2. Desiring special classes for children with disabilities such as dyslexia, dysgraphia, blindness, and/or deafness;
3. Calls for transportation for all students, which can be done by sending a bus to pick them up at their own homes;
4. Declaring that food should be provided at the school;
5. Considering that children should be informed about the importance of a healthy life style;

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6. Taking note that children should take time off after class to exercise and to do cultural crafts;
7. Recommending that schools consider starting at 10 a.m. so that students are completely focused and ready to study, and proclaiming that they should end at 4 p.m.;
8. Emphasizes that states should ensure the children are safe during school;
9. Requests that schools have medical care available;
10. Considers that children have relevant learning;
11. Recommends that the school is a no bullying zone so that children will not feel insecure;
12. Authorizes that schools should have natural disaster preparation.
