Topic: Rights to Self-Determination

Co-Sponsors: Australia, Azerbaijan, Bangladesh, Brazil, Canada, China, Cuba, Egypt, France, Indonesia, Iraq, Italy, Nigeria, Pakistan, Rwanda, Saudi Arabia, Sudan, Syria, United States and Venezuela.

Reminding all nations to support the United Nations Charter and the rights to self-determination,

Believing that countries should vote on a two-state solution for both Palestine and Israel,

<u>Aware that</u> territories are being threatened such as Chechnya, Tibet, Palestine, and Crimea because they are trying to exercise the rights to self-determination,

<u>Deeply concerned</u> that we should have the Security Council and SOCHUM help territories become countries,

<u>Deeply convinced</u> that the committee thinks Palestine and Israel are aware that selfdetermination has been encouraged by the United Nations 3rd committee,

- Calls Upon both committees to help solve this problem and encourage other nations to support the UN Charter;
- 2. Fully aware that many countries do not encourage the rights to self-determination;

- 3. Encourages that the P5 countries try to find the path to peace with territories by voting on two-state solutions;
- 4. Reminds that the past achievements the United Nations has tried to make peace with Russia, Crimea, Palestine, Israel, Chechnya, Tibet, and China;
- 5. Proclaims that Israel is abusing human rights in Palestine;
- Recommends that countries should educate people to fight for the ability to exercise the rights to self-determination;
- Calls on countries to give some power to territories to eventually become independent countries in the future;
- 8. Further recommends that territories should be able to govern themselves without threats;
- 9. Considers having a representative committee for each culture founded by each state for each state's culture to communicate with one another; and
- 10. Believing that there should be areas where certain minorities can go if they want to govern themselves along with the original government.
