Topic: Situation in Ukraine.

The Security Council, reminding all member states the importance of protecting and securing all nations and maintaining peace and security,

Bearing in mind the international community has brought economic sanctions against Russia;

Noting with regret, 2,500 Ukrainians have been killed,

Fully aware that on July 17th 2014 a civilian airliner with 298 people on board was shot down over eastern Ukraine, most likely accidentally by the rebels,

Having examined that on August 15th 2014, Ukraine said its military engaged Russian tanks crossing the border,

Further recalling that on August 21st ,2014 satellite imagery spotted Russian artillery crossing the border to fire at Ukrainian forces,

Emphasizing that any referendum held by the local government of Crimea without the express authority of Ukraine is unconstitutional and illegitimate,

Reaffirming Article 4, Chapter 2 of the UN Charter which states that “All members shall refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial

integrity or political independence of any state, or in any other manner inconsistent with the purposes of the United Nations”,

Deeply conscious of the UN General Assembly resolution on March 27th, 2014 which Stated Russia’s annexation of Crimea as illegal and described as “having no validity”,

1. Calls upon a cease-fire, the two sides withdraw heavy weapons effective range for at least three weeks;
2. Further invites more organizations such as the UNHCR to get involved allowing actions to stay in line;
3. Urges to have humanitarian aid such as vaccines and medical care provided to those who are suffering due to this conflict;
4. Further requests to have a diplomatic solution between the Russian Federation and the Ukraine about the status of Crimea;
5. Strongly affirms that Russia must stop sending troops across the borders of Ukraine;
6. Suggests that the two sides carefully handle the disagreement to avoid the conflict from spreading to other areas close to Crimea.
