**Topic:** Financing Peacekeeping Missions - War and Disaster

Expressing its concern that war and disaster is dangerous,

Fully aware of the work that peacekeepers do,

Regrets to inform that war and disaster needs more help,

Aware of the \$90 million cost of the new mission,

Believing that UNMIK cannot afford any cuts,

Having considered the \$90 million must come from UNIFIL, MINUSTAH, UNMIK,

Deeply concerned about the underfunding of these three missions,

Recognizing UNIFIL is the most expensive of all the three missions,

1. Requests a sustainable trading system;
2. Supports other countries with amenities such as education and healthcare;
3. Draws the attention and money to peacekeeping, rather than military service;
4. Calls upon the removal of \$39 million from police and military cost in MINUSTAH;
5. Recommends pulling \$35 million from military and police in UNIFIL;
6. Considers taking \$10 million from civilian and personnel costs in UNIFIL;
7. Requests the removal of \$1 million from air transportation in MINUSTAH;
8. Supports taking \$5 million from facilities and infrastructures in MINUSTAH.
