

Resolution UN Women/I.I

UN Women Committee

Co-sponsors: Islamic Republic of Afghanistan, People's Democratic Republic of Algeria, Republic of Angola, Republic of Botswana, Kingdom of Cambodia, Republic of Cameroon, Republic of Iceland, Republic of Korea, Malaysia, Kingdom of Morocco, Republic of Mozambique, Republic of Namibia, Republic of Rwanda, and Slovak Republic.

Topic: Political Gender Equality

Noting with deep concern, the financial inequality for women, and the lack of female representation in government and awareness of this issue due to a combination of male biases, limited access to education, financial issues, social and cultural barriers, and generational cycles,

Noting with regret women feel unrepresented and therefore not encouraged enough to take high profile jobs, and if they are not encouraged to take government jobs, some groups may not feel represented,

Recognising the restrictions on women in government with regard to voting, access to higher level positions, and decision making, that result from tokenism,

Fully aware that not all groups of people are aware of the inequalities against women in education,

Deeply concerned by the low amount of laws protecting women from physical and sexual assault happening to women around the world,

- Recommends that nations amend and propose laws with the purpose of empowering women and countries implement new policies protecting women and a minimum amount of women's awareness programs per city/town;
- 2. Requests that the United Nations and the UN Women committee host webinars/workshops that help women make a career in politics and have a voice;
- 3. Encourages online educational courses for women and a place where women can talk about their experiences;
- 4. Encourages funding for and support by member states of NGOs and IGOs that support women in politics and educate people about the inequalities women face;
- 5. Calls upon nations to emphasize clarity between governments and the United Nations regarding the amount of power women hold;
- 6. Further requests that in all member states, 35% of government positions should be held by women by the year 2050;
- 7. Endorses the creation of microfinancing programs that would support women financially and funding for campaign assistance for women looking to engage in political elections;
- 8. Supports the termination of controversy over women's rights around the world;
- 9. Confirms that women have an equal opportunity to receive quality education;

- 10. Further requests that the UN help put in free child care centers to support families in low income areas;
- 11. Calls upon the UN to fund more ramps for the disabled and health care locations in low income areas;
- 12. Express its hope to have establishments provide parental leaves for women;
- 13. Encourages a minimum amount of education pertaining to women's safety and that schools offer programs and classes for self defense, for online reasons each family should have access to a computer funded by the UN.
