Topic: Global Action on Patient Safety

Aware of the lack of staff with adequate medical experience,

Knowing that access to healthcare is crucial,

Noting with deep concern that some countries do not have enough healthcare facilities,

Keeping in mind that health insurance is expensive in some countries,

Noting with regret the lack of funding and safety in medical care and reports of misinformation,

Emphasizing the need for a safer medical environment,

Better Staffing in Health Care

1. Urges countries to give financial aid to other countries in need of financial support regarding healthcare;
2. Call upon governments, the UN and hospitals to create and improve training courses for healthcare staff;
3. Recommends that hospitals should hire more staff with sufficient medical experience;

Accessibility to Healthcare

4. Recommends creating and supporting organizations such as the Red Cross;
5. Encourages countries financially and medically stable to assist medical schools in struggling countries with their healthcare programs;
6. Greatly encourages larger communities to help smaller communities with accessibility to healthcare;
7. Requests the implementation of affordable universal healthcare;
8. Recommends that hospitals use well trained medical students as volunteers;

Better Medical Care Funding and Safety

9. Strongly advises financially and medically secure countries in the united nations to provide financial aid to struggling countries for medical purposes;
10. Advises frequent evaluations in hospitals and that the World Health Organization makes a list of requirements and yearly safety checks;
11. Further requests better training courses for doctors and nurses such courses must be refreshed regularly;
12. Draws the attention to certain medical tools that can only be used once;
13. Reminds that reusable medical tools should be properly disinfected after use;

Education of Hospitals

14. Encourages governments to set up websites with credible healthcare information;
15. Endorses the marking of misinformation on websites with user generated content and social media platforms;

16. Believes that the communication, like a Q&A, between medical professionals and civilians is key in preventing misinformation.
