Topic: The situation in Central America: progress in fashioning a region of peace, freedom, democracy and development

Acknowledging the large amount of gang violence in Central America,

Considering the victims of gang violence,

Recognizing the lack of safety within Central America,

Deeply concerned by increased crime rates in Central America,

Recognizing the impact of cartels in Central America,

Acknowledging the lack of healthcare, education, shelter, and food,

Taking into account the benefit and risks of legalizing minor drugs,

Ensuring Safety, and Security

1. Strongly encourages security intervention for vulnerable individuals;
2. Calls upon developed nations to fund NGOs pertaining to the prevention of drug trafficking;

3. Advises corruption be addressed;
4. Demands the improvement of criminal prosecution
5. Draws the attention of member states to NGOs and existing foundations;

Gangs

6. Furthermore recommends the incarceration of gang leaders;
7. Encourages gangs to become youth groups;
8. Endorses the legalization of gangs;
9. Requests that gangs get better representation;

Aid

10. Instructs developed member states to accept refugees from regions struggling with gang violence;
11. Requests the creation of an initiative to educate underprivileged communities to independently farm their own food;
12. Urges the creation of shelters for the homeless or those in danger;
13. Suggests to the capable countries to both send support and welcome refugees;
14. Instructs to send peacekeepers for humanitarian aid to countries suffering from gang violence;

Addressing Drugs

15. Advises the funding and expansion of existing and accessible education programs for all;
16. Requests schools to educate minors on drug use;
17. Reminds that legalizing minor drugs will substantially decrease drug consumption and profit;
18. Recommends the usage of already existing drug control organizations;
19. Urges border control to eliminate drug trafficking;
20. Also recommends better security when obtaining drugs;
21. Calls upon nations to monitor drug intake;
22. Advises member nations to create regulations relating to drug use.
