Topic: Youth, Disarmament and Non-Proliferation

Fully aware that some schools are beginning to educate children about the use of weapons including weapons of mass destruction,

Noting with deep concern that child soldiers still get forcefully conscripted to the military today and that it violates the rights of the child,

Expressing concern on the manufacturing and distribution of weapons of mass destruction,

Taking into account the effect of testing and using weapons of mass destruction on our Earth and its population,

Keeping in mind that weapons of mass destruction are negatively impacting countries around the world,

Observing countries misusing these weapons,

Observing that few countries possess these weapons, but that some of them misuse them such as the Russia-Ukraine conflict,

Bearing in mind that the youth population isn't aware and educated on how dangerous weapons of mass destruction are,

A child's education on impact awareness and disarmament of weapons of mass destruction and cybersecurity

1. Requests that governments give 15% more money to schools to add a curriculum about weapons of mass destruction;
2. Calls upon the UN member states to eradicate the use of child soldiers;
3. Emphasizes that youth should not be able to bear arms of any kind, this is not safe as there have been multiple instances where a child bearing arms has led to the death of innocent people;
4. Welcomes youth role in disarmament by promoting peace through content creation;
5. Proclaims that member states should not be allowed to draft soldiers at a young age, and that the age that they can join the army should be higher;
6. Further proclaims that local youth summits should be held where youth may discuss their solutions to disarmament and non-proliferation and present them to the UN;
7. Urges governments with large nuclear weapon stockpiles to sign and ratify treaties like the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW) and the Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT);

How to stop the creation, transportation of materials, future use, and aftermath of weapons of mass destruction on our planet

8. Requests that all member states sign and ratify a treaty limiting the manufacturing of weapons of mass destruction;
9. Draws the attention on UN member states to decommission uranium mines;
10. Urges all member states to ratify the NPT agreement and the Fissile Material Cut-off Treaty (FMCT);

Youth education and awareness on understanding weapons of mass destruction and the lasting effects on the environment via social media

11. Calls upon countries that have access to technology to spread awareness via social media platforms;
12. Endorses countries to add to their education that understanding weapons of mass destruction;
13. Encourages countries to help the smaller and vulnerable countries;

The use of weapons of mass destruction and how they affect us

14. Suggests banning the use of weapons of mass destruction;
15. Further invites using nuclear energy in places that truly need it;
16. Calls upon the United Nations member states to safely dismantle nuclear weapons;
17. Demands that member states cease stockpiling weapons of mass destruction;
18. Recommends member states to stop spending money on weapons of mass destruction and cease their development and testing as well;
19. Invites member states to further educate citizens on the effects of weapons of mass destruction.
