Topic: Human rights questions, including alternative approaches for improving the effective enjoyment of human rights and fundamental freedoms - the right to privacy in the digital age

Emphasizing the need for safety online through globally standardized protocols,

Reaffirming the importance of the protection of personal information,

Recognizing the number of uneducated youth online,

Taking into account the global losses and child endangerment due to data sharing,

Deeply concerned by amount of data being compromised,

Bearing in mind Article 12 of the UDHR that states all people are deserving of privacy,

Protecting Online Rights

- I. Further recommends reducing requirement of personal data to access sites;

2. Encourages the federal level to protect the privacy of citizens/individuals and to assist other growing nations;
3. Seeks the prevention of identity theft;

Internet Protocols

4. Recognizes the strengthening of moderation protocols;
5. Calls upon non-invasive surveillance to protect the privacy of internet users;
6. Endorses the development of software for detection of data breaches and privacy violations;
7. Acknowledges the need for public attention and support such as media resources surrounding this issue.

Youth Safety and Awareness

8. Recommends the implementation of school programs for youth safety online;
9. Strongly encourages education for families on online safety;
10. Actively encourages browsers to give users customization of personal data tracking;
11. Advises limits on the data tracking of minors;

Right to Data Privacy

12. Suggests member states to educate on the rights of data privacy;
13. Further requests the creation of stronger, more accessible antiviruses;
14. Calls upon country states to create safe data storages that are private;
15. Endorses the installment of clear and non-invasive user agreements.
