Weapons

- I. Draws attention internationally to nuclear protocols;
- 2. Request countries to not weaponize unless for defensive purposes and legal games and sports;
- 3. Strongly encourages the banning of nuclear weapons production;
- 4. Requests nations to refrain from weaponizing AI;

Technology

5. Further requests the enhancement of security software to combat cyber attacks;

- 6. Encourages nations to give money to developing countries to help them enhance their technology;
- 7. Promotes the use of firewalls to protect personal information online;
- 8. Further requests the raising of age requirements for weapons;

Security

- 9. Expresses hope that developed countries help fund developing countries for security;
- 10. Further recommends more security on the public purchase of weapons;
- 11. Further requests the education of the public on security;
- 12. Calls upon the need for more funding in the context of secure technology;

Peace

- 13. Supports the promotion of peace through peaceful protests and commercials;
- 14. Further invites countries to participate in additional meetings to discuss peace and security;
- 15. Strongly encourages the further development of treaties regarding peace and security.
