Topic: Reducing space threats through norms, rules and principles of responsible behaviors

Affirming that states should cooperate on a peaceful area that enhances international growth, Fully aware of the danger to security from space threats,

International Space Cooperation

- 1. Requests countries to collaborate in order to capture space debris,
- 2. Urges nations to exchange technological advancements, discoveries, and actions with the international community;

Renewing and Re-Signing of Resolutions

- 3. Advises an annual revisiting and modification of past treaties and resolutions;
- 4. Recommends nations to sign all treaties and resolutions related to space threats;

Monitoring and Educating Countries Based on Space Threats

5. Advises states to take effective measures to regulate human behavior, such as establishing more stringent launch and recovery standards;

- 6. Calls upon major companies and developed countries to take action on space threats;
- 7. Emphasizes the role of NGOs in space exploration;

Monitoring and Maintaining Nonviolent Space Threats

- 8. Recognizes the need for education on space threats and space debris;
- 9. Calls upon all countries to implement systems that monitor and maintain nonviolent space threats;
- 10. Advises countries that are able to take action against space threats whenever possible by routinely monitoring and recycling space debris;
- 11. Calls for countries to be aware of the space junk created by spacecraft launches;
- 12. Advises member states and companies to fund an NGO on the deflection or destruction of debris.
