Topic: Reduction of military budgets

Acknowledging that some countries require a higher military budgets due to current conflict, Fully aware of the alarming growth and excess spending towards military expenditures, Confident that if countries work together to reduce military budgets which can significantly reduce conflict,

Emphasizing the need to reallocate military budget to the local economy,

Believing that communication is a crucial component in reducing military spending,

Encourages member states to join local military groups or organizations,

Acknowledges that nations need to balance between reducing military budgets while maintaining national security

Recognizing the need to educate citizens about the reduction of military budgets and seeking programs to educate citizens about the issue,

Acknowledging organizations, non governmental organizations which help educate citizens who lack the education on military budgets and how they impact society,

Deeply concerned about their population of uneducated citizens on military budget,

Obstacles or Roadblocks to Defunding

- I. Invites more peaceful resolutions to potential uprising wars and/or overlapping claims;
- 2. Recommends developing member states to rely more on the military aid and charity;
- 3. Strongly encourages member states to increase worldwide political connections;

Education

- 4. Invite citizens to engage in programs and organizations to study/learn about how we can lower military budgets
- 5. Set up PSA ads to spotlight the effects of overspending and reaching people through social online resources to foster collaboration between companies to redirect military budgets
- 6. Invite nonprofits to donate money to lower-income countries who can afford to lower their military budgets

Communication

- 7. Calls for member states to annually report to MILEX (United Nations Report on Military Expenditures)
- 8. Directs member states to minimize military budgets based on conflict or situation;
- 9. Encourages communication between regional blocs;
- 10. Further recommends annual meetings between member states to increase trust and transparency internationally;
