Topic: Universal health coverage

Fully alarmed by the cost of healthcare and its inaccessibility in certain countries,

Aware of the lack of medical resources and acknowledges the need for further advancements in healthcare,

Observing that citizens develop diseases due to poor diet and lack of exercise,

Convinced that nations should collaborate to resolve these issues to the best of their abilities,

Recognizing the current global and the impact they have on access to quality healthcare,

Seeking the innovation of medical services in developing areas,

Funding

1. Request that medical companies provide more access to their products;
2. Strongly urges countries to trade in exchange for medical resources;
3. Suggests that governments optimize local funding;

Advances in Healthcare

4. Further invites more developed nations to support less developed communities;
5. Endorses health worker education and preventative cures;

6. Recommends that citizens follow basic hygiene using plentiful resources;
7. Proclaims that all people should receive the same quality healthcare;

Global Cooperation on Healthcare Equality

8. Strongly encourages international collaborations programs in help advice for developing countries focused in older adults and other populations in need;
9. Calls upon countries that have successfully established effective health coverage to be models to improve systems globally;
10. Supports the implementation of mental health education in school systems;
11. Recommends citizens in rural areas to utilize local resources/supplies whenever possible;

Access in Remote or Rural Areas

12. Calls upon developed nations to provide urgent care services and medical supplies to create urgent care stations in medical deserts;
13. Calls for a unified healthcare system to help countries in need that is assisted by NGOs such as Doctors with Borders;
14. Encourages the implementation of economic incentives for long-term medical workers;
15. Encourages countries to educate and hire doctors that are sent to medical deserts to help out with medical challenges.
