Topic: Pandemic preparedness and response

Fully alarmed by the lack of preventative measures, surveillance, and detection globally such as communication and education on the risks of spreading pandemics,

Deeply concerned by the inability of certain regions to take necessary preventative measures due to poor infrastructure or limited resources,

Having considered the misinformation in some research known to the public,

Observing that some countries still have epidemic diseases that cause serious harm,

Recognizing the dangers of a widespread pandemic and expresses empathy for lives that are lost,

Acknowledging the need for better communication systems,

Fully aware of the poor funding of prevention care systems,

Keeping in mind that not all member states have access to vaccines and all healthcare supplies,

Global Preventative Measures

1. Encourages nations to communicate and collaborate to find effective solutions that fit the circumstances;
2. Calls upon nations to do pre-pandemic funding to prevent any monetary issues during pandemics;
3. Advises member states to collaborate with private corporations and NGOs to advance technologies to assist with pandemic preparedness;
4. Urges nations to make responsible use of natural resources in exchange for medical supplies;
5. Supports the development of free vaccines to prevent the spread of pandemics;

Research and Surveillance

6. Endorses online information consultations that are multilingual;
7. Expresses its hope for regular inspections on the progress of research and surveillance;
8. Encourages member states to increase their funding of research in diseases;
9. Further recommends enhancing the safety of animals and humans by monitoring for zoonotic diseases both domestically and in countries with high migratory flows;
10. Desires every country affected by the latest pandemic to enhance healthcare capacity and stockpile medical supplies;
11. Draws the attention to the negative impact that pandemics have on impoverished regions;

Funding

12. Urges countries to create a fund for emergency pandemic scenarios;
13. Directs nations to fund better communication systems for pandemic information;
14. Calls upon wealthier nations to provide vaccinations for people in lower income countries;
15. Emphasizes the need for affordable and quality healthcare;
16. Suggests that countries provide free supplies and healthcare to prevent sickness;

Response

17. Strongly encourages the creation of world summits to address the effects of pandemics;
18. Ensures that citizens and low income areas can have access to inexpensive vaccines during pandemics;
19. Urges nations to support NGOs in the case of a pandemic;
20. Further invites all citizens to practice proper hygiene and sanitation methods;
21. Recommends programs to build trust among countries to exchange healthcare information;
22. Invites countries to provide trustworthy information about the pandemic at hand;

23. Requests that countries respond quickly to pandemics.
