Topic: Women's meaningful participation in peace processes

Acknowledging the fact that women have been previously excluded from peace processes,

Deeply concerned by the amount of stereotypes against women,

Alarmed by the amount of discrimination towards women in politics,

Taking into consideration the amount of gender-based violence,

Taking into account that programs and campaigns can help women,

Viewing with appreciation the work that member states have done to help create more opportunities for women in positions of power,

Confidence that programs and campaigns can lower the absence of women in political power,

Aware of the strength of the programs that will bring women into the peace process,

Seeking more political jobs for women,

Noting that schools should inform students about gender equality,

Alarmed by the domestic violence against women,

Fully aware that women need to be represented in all governments,

Recognizing the issue of gender inequality in peace processes,

Aware of the lack of women in the government,

Notes that women are not able to be a part of policy-making,

Peace Processes with Women:

1. Invites more women to participate in peace process;
2. Suggest all countries to establish stricter laws to protect women's rights;
3. Urges all countries to treat everyone in politics equally;
4. Calls for the government to fund women in the peace process;
5. Further recommends women to attend more international conferences for peace;
6. Invites countries to fund training for women in for peace process-meeting-and politics;
7. Strongly encourages all member states to recognize the gap between men and women;

Programs and Campaign:

8. Designates programs and campaigns to include women in the peace process;
9. Calls upon countries to design programs that educate people on gender equality;
10. Further invites more programs and campaigns for women;
11. Welcomes all political campaigns to include women in accordance with gender equality;
12. Requests that government officials will support campaigns for women;
13. Draws attention to government officials to create equal opportunities for women in politics;
14. Calls upon governments to raise awareness towards the importance of women in the peace process;

Jobs and Education

15. Advising more schools to join MMUN;
16. Endorses all schools to educate children on women meaning full participation in peace processes;
17. Further invites women to take leadership roles;
18. Requests that all countries create opportunities for women;
19. Urges countries to teach women to identify signs of misinformation;
20. Calls upon governments to have education programs for women to resist extremism;
21. Encourages more MMUN education on this topic worldwide;

Policies

22. Recommends the solution of longer sentence time towards gender-based violence;
23. Acknowledges that more women should be involved in governments;
24. Expresses appreciation for women's involvement in peace processes;
25. Invites governments to take action by enforcing policies for women;
26. Further recommends that whoever discriminates against women should pay a fee.
