Topic: Universal health coverage

Recognizing the frequent changes in health systems,

Alarmed by the insufficiency of funds for hospitals and medical facilities,

Also alarmed by the lack of knowledge on universal healthcare coverage,

Also acknowledging long wait times,

Fully aware of the harsh working conditions of medical professionals,

Observing how countries have to prioritize other major issues,

Deeply concerned with how patients are treated,

Aware of the effect that high prices of medical treatments and medicine have on poverty,

Expressing concern about the lack of medical services and centers,

Deeply concerned by the artificial inflation caused by companies,

Realizing the waste of existing resources,

Noting the lack of medication, technology and transportation,

Bearing in mind the understaffing in medical centers,

Funding

1. Encourages volunteers with rewards;
2. Calls upon clauses and agreements to include funds donation for universal health care;
3. Suggests to invest in ambulances, mobile nurses and medical services;

4. Also suggests to reallocate a percentage of taxes to medical services;
5. Affirms the improvement of health care organization and facilities;

The Quality of Healthcare

6. Affirms the improvement of health care organization and facilities;
7. Emphasises the need for improvement of healthcare organization systems;;
8. Trusts that hospitals prioritize quality maintenance;
9. Also calls upon improvement of medical education and training;

Accessibility

10. Calls for the expansion of ambulatory or outpatient care;
11. Urges for regulation on prices for medication and services;
12. Emphasizes the need for medical centers in lacking areas;

Limited Resources

13. Emphasizes the need for medication and services;
14. Seeks to increase the number of medical professionals;
15. Proclaims the importance of maximizing the use of available resources;
16. Advises to encourage medical workers in underdeveloped countries by increasing their salary;
17. Calls upon health technology assessment.
