Topic: Relationship Between Disarmament and Sustainable Development

Observing that many countries are dealing with poverty, no education, and hunger,

Keeping in mind that equality and human rights are not always respected in many countries,

Fully aware that many countries do not have access to clean water and energy,

Bearing in mind that too many weapons can affect sustainable development,

Expressing concern that sustainable development is not possible if global disarmament does not progress,

Noting with regret that many areas are not developed, due to war and humanitarian issues,

Taking into consideration that all women, children and marginalized groups should be treated the same way as everyone else,

Realizing that women should be able to do the same things as men,

Keeping in mind that everyone should have access to a normal life even if they have a disability,

Observing that many countries are not able to disarm properly,

Alarmed by the number of wars going on around the world,

Declaring that most countries are not disarming due to the risk of other countries attacking them,

Bearing in mind that too much money is going to military purposes rather than basic education, healthcare, and other needs,

Noting with regret that nuclear weapons are not disposed of safely,

SDGs and Basic Needs

1. Encourages quality education and building more schools for all countries;
2. Encourages clean water and zero hunger across all nations;
3. Calls for countries to invest in research on good health and well-being;
4. Strongly encourages climate action and protecting life on land, such as through stopping deforestation and not endangering animals;
5. Recommends reducing poverty in all nations;
6. Calls upon countries to improve work by having more job opportunities so we can have economic growth;

Development

7. Encourages countries to participate in treaties to control arms;
8. Encourages the safe and responsible use of nuclear power;
9. Calls upon countries to increase the usage of sustainable energy rather than using non-renewable energy like coal;
10. Calls for countries to integrate wildlife into urban infrastructure to help the environment and animal's natural habitats;
11. Recommends countries invest in clean, affordable, and renewable energy so that countries can grow their economies;
12. Requests that countries reduce their use of fossil fuels so as to improve air quality and respiratory health;

Disarmament

13. Calls for weapon-free zones due to the risk of nuclear attacks that lead to serious injuries, death and infections;
14. Invites countries to sign peace treaties to reduce conflicts worldwide;
15. Encourages countries to reduce their military budgets and spread the money to different aspects such as education, healthcare, renewable energy, and peace initiatives, so that citizens can live a better life;
16. Further recommends that weapons are disposed of and recycled properly;

Human Rights, Women, Children and Marginalized Groups

17. Encourages the more fortunate to help the less fortunate people;
18. Advises that all children should have access to a good education;
19. Recommends countries to form a group of experts and volunteers (from a range of fields including ex-army and police people who volunteer) to stop crimes;
20. Recommends countries to form a group of experts to help stop poverty;
21. Strongly encourages that we all treat the less fortunate people the same way they treat fortunate people.
