Human Rights Council Commission

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Topic: Human Rights of Migrants

Acknowledging that migrants around the world are being stripped of their basic human rights,

Recognizing the importance of international cooperation to ensure migrants access to education, healthcare, employment, and other basic needs,

Noting with deep concern the impact of xenophobia on migrants on their mental and physical health,

Recognizes that the existing programs and organizations don't have enough resources to help all migrants,

Keeping in mind that when migrants don't have access to health care and education, it can have a negative impact on all migrant lives and society around them,

Alarmed by the fact that healthcare statuses are not accessible to migrants,

Deeply concerned by the amount of migrants prosecuted in foreign countries ,

Noting with concern the lack of legal status documentation and protection for migrants,

Noting with concern how many families are separated during migration,

Acknowledging that detention centers can be challenging on migrant's mental and physical health,

Detention and Separation in Migrant Families

1. Urges governments to collect more data on how many migrant families are separated;
2. Suggests action be taken to regulate the amount of migrants put in detention for unnecessary reasons;
3. Calls for more humane living conditions for migrants in detention with funding from willing and able countries;
4. Requests governments to implement a human rights-based border governance that enforces the law in place of inhumane groups;
5. Requests able and willing countries to create new programs to reunite already separated families;

Proper Legal Action and Protocols

6. Urges member states to simplify documentation and asylum procedures to protect vulnerable migrants;
7. Encourages governments to create an international zone for peace and shelter;
8. Strongly encourages more programs be made for victims of human trafficking to find a safe home for families;
9. Endorse humanitarian response to refugee crisis, such as housing, healthcare, and education;
10. Advises governments to take legal action against human rights violators, all violations could be addressed on a case by case basis;

The Expansion of Education and Healthcare for Migrants

11. Supports expanding education programs for migrants by willing and able governments by increasing funding and creating volunteer opportunities;
12. Encouraging funding from developed, willing, and able countries to improve healthcare for struggling countries;

13. Urges educators to provide programs on xenophobia and inequality to limit discrimination against migrants;
14. Suggests the implementation of lower healthcare costs in willing and able countries for migrants without a stable income;
15. Calls upon member states to create and fund awareness campaigns to be aware of the inequality towards migrants;

Security, Safety, and Basic Necessities for Migrants

16. Recommends funding for desalination plants to provide a constant source of fresh water from developed member states;
17. Calls upon local communities to incorporate migrants into their lives;
18. Calls upon states to prioritize non-custodial alternatives to detention and to ensure that when detention is unavailable, conditions are humane & respect the inherent the dignity of the person;
19. Encourages countries to create a law ensuring the physical safety and the right to be free from violence for migrants;
20. Urges the creation of safer methods of travel during the migration process that can be funded by willing countries;
21. Encourages migrant shelters to produce basic needs, this can include water, food, and work opportunities;
22. Emphasizes the need for migrants to have a say in what the government does to them.
