Topic: Education for Democracy

Acknowledging the lack of democratic knowledge in youth,

Recognising that some countries have limited civic education,

Acknowledges the need for educational programs,

Aware of the lack of education for democracy,

Bearing in mind that educational websites aren't being produced at a high enough rate,

Draws attention to member states that don't provide free education to all of their citizens,

Accounting for the fact that some countries aren't following the same democratic method of governing,

Taking into account the fact that most kids will not receive a democratic education,

Fully aware that 72% of citizens live under dictatorships,

Bearing in mind that not enough democratic education is taught in schools,

Aware of the fact that team building is a good source of creating democracy,

Deeply conscious that not all member states believe in or have democracies,

Viewing with appreciation that some member states are not all democracies, but some member states are trying to expand their democratic ways,

Knowledge of Democracy

1. Calls for non-profit organizations to fund and support informing people about government policies;
2. Welcomes school boards to incorporate more free speech into the school curriculum;
3. Encourages extracurricular activities in communities and schools to help educate about the different types of governments;

Democratic Educational Programs

4. Recommends exchange programs to learn others' cultural opinions;
5. Authorises countries to have freely accessible education programs;
6. Strongly encourages schools of the world to hold free speech programs,
7. Requests the implementation of education for creating a stronger community within the curriculum;
8. Requests UNESCO to create a centralized multilingual online database of democratic education resources;
9. Further recommends the creation of educational websites teaching about different government structures;

Foundation for Democratic Future

10. Encourages local NGOs to contribute to educational programs;
11. Urges countries to provide teacher training to further educate students to speak up;
12. Recommends that communities have optional public courses that teach about human rights;
13. Welcomes the idea that people of all demographics will be able to access education;
14. Invites the schools to offer interactive extracurricular courses for all students;

Sharing Democratic Values Globally

15. Calls upon member states to give students a better understanding of how to collaborate with the community;
16. Invites NGOs to support democratic education;

17. Welcomes making public centers that include technologies for global citizenship education;
18. Welcomes member states to implement the GCED program;
19. Encourages member states to teach certain aspects of democratic education;
20. Recommends holding open debates to promote freedom of speech;
21. Advises schools to include student councils in curriculums to influence students on what it's like to have a vote.
