Topic: Refugee and Migrant Health

Acknowledging international struggle and discrimination against refugees and migrants,

Recognizing the importance of vaccination within refugee camps,

Emphasizing the need for sanitary conditions in refugee encampments,

Alarmed by the lack of clean drinking water and basic resources for migrants and refugees,

Taking into consideration that many refugees and migrants are not financially stable,

Expressing concern that it is difficult for displaced people or migrants to keep stable employment,

Conscious of the fact that healthcare for refugees and migrants is not adequate,

Acknowledging the fact that refugees and immigrants are living in dangerous conditions,

Aware of the lack of efforts towards global cooperation,

Acknowledging the poor living conditions of migrants in many countries,

Deeply concerned by the discrimination that immigrants and refugees face in many countries, preventing their abilities to access basic necessities,

Physical and Mental Healthcare

1. Approves activities (meditation, exercise groups, therapeutic groups, etc.) related to physical and mental health in the concentrated area of immigrant groups;
2. Suggests the use of Mobile Multi-Service Integration Hubs (MSIH) to support refugees with psychosocial, legal, physical, and digital struggles, similar to screening stations, with health personnel at all times;

3. Invites all Member States to construct health clinics for migrants and refugees, with donations when needed;
4. Encourages citizens to donate unused or unwanted clothing and attire to refugees and camps;
5. Designates a medical area specifically for migrants in countries with high refugee concentrations;
6. Urges governments of member states to provide affordable health care and insurance for migrants and refugees, which covers vaccines and twice-annual check-ups (as well as acute and chronic illnesses);
7. Encourages nations to review residency and labour laws to align with international standards that include protections for migrants' health and well-being;
8. Recommends governments to set aside 0.2-0.4% of their GDP or tax money for younger (13 and under) migrant populations' health annually with review after 2 decades;
9. Expresses its hopes for filtration devices and fresh water shipment donation;

Financial Security

10. Encourages member states to help finance refugees and migrants' basic necessities globally;
11. Calls upon corporations to help employ refugees and migrants;
12. Urges countries to provide designated housing to refugees and migrants;
13. Calls for countries to create food banks specifically for refugees and migrants;
14. Expresses its hope that corporations will help finance long-term employment for refugees and migrants;
15. Requests countries to assist in funding medical insurance for refugees and migrants to cover healthcare costs;
16. Urges the citizens of more financially stable countries to help provide resources for hospitals and mobile health clinics, which will provide basic healthcare to refugees and migrants;

Global Cooperation

17. Calls upon countries to increase disease prevention efforts to protect migrant and refugee health;
18. Encourages cooperation through internet media to support refugee healthcare;
19. Suggests online funding organizations to support migrant and refugee healthcare especially in countries with an underdeveloped healthcare system;
20. Calls for member states of the UN to improve or create high-quality shelters in war zones for refugees and migrants
21. Emphasizes the importance of affordable preventive healthcare insurance, if not, then acute healthcare, for migrants globally;

22. Introduces an educational program to educate and raise awareness on the refugees and migrants in need of healthcare;

Social Services

23. Encourages funding for refugee and migrant camps for basic hygiene and health;

24. Requests member states to assist migrants and refugees to adapt to society by providing housing, basic necessities, healthcare, equal voting, and stable income;

25. Calls upon the creation of mobile medical transportation for migrants in rural areas through WHO;

26. Suggests that within 30 days, a migrant or refugee could have an optional but highly recommended health visit that integrates them into a national healthcare system for early detection and prevention of diseases;

27. Urges countries to establish charities that distribute basic human resources, such as clean water and nourishment.
