Topic: The Human Rights of Migrants

Alarmed by migrants’ unsafe conditions, such as gang violence, exploitation and trafficking,

Underlining the fact that migrants are suffering from underpay and can not leave or protest because they speak a different language,

Stressing that migrants do not have climate-resistant homes which forces them onto unsafe travel conditions,

Deeply concerned by the state of migrants including the condition of their integration, education, employment, and access to safe spaces,

Recognising that the discrimination against migrants is the cause of the lack of inclusion and security of migrant communities,

Taking into consideration that migrants do not have enough job opportunities and are being sent to detentions and jails, and being sent back to their countries and third countries and are being called criminals for no reason,

Integration and Safe Spaces

1. Emphasizes the government need to protect and treat migrants equally;
2. Urges migrants to take advantage of safe spaces and the advantages that they have, such as funds to create small businesses;
3. Calls for charities to fund more establishments of migrant safe spaces;
4. Takes note of the fact that most people were once migrants;
5. Recommends that the government advertise safe spaces to migrants;

Housing and Job Equality

6. Advises to check on migrants to make sure they are not being exploited;
7. Directs language lessons funded by the government or charities for those who do not understand or know the language;
8. Urges more hospitals to be closer to migrants;
9. Calls for more climate-resistant shelters through a financial campaign;
10. Requires monitoring that migrants are getting paid through third parties and financial budgets online;
11. Urges to confirm that migrants are not working in dangerous places;
12. Expresses its hope that protection is given to the migrants who enter;

Safety and Travelling

13. Recommends creating free, safe hospitals where migrants can seek healthcare;
14. Emphasises charity collecting from citizens to provide migrants with free resources such as food, shelter or water, and job opportunities to improve their well-being;
15. Endorses the committee to help keep migrants safe and healthy in their new country by using money from the budget;
16. Encourages the committee to fund research on global crime organizations and how to solve this pressing issue;
17. Believing that migrants should have access to safer travelling routes to avoid displacement or being smuggled or trafficked;

Education and Employment for Migrants and their Community

18. Encourages fundraisers to fund migrant shelters;
19. Suggests screening migrants and identifying those with the greatest needs;
20. Calls upon creating translation policies to help migrants understand everything that is not in their first language;
21. Requests partnering with business leaders to make solutions so country nationals and migrants can work together to establish cultural links and progress towards a united identity globally.
