Topic: Education for Democracy

Alarmed by the fact that 244 million children are not in school,

Aware of the fact that many children cannot afford school,

Bearing in mind that 40% of teachers do not have the resources to teach democratic values,

Aware of schools lacking democratic curriculums,

Keeping in mind the poor quality educations that many students are going through,

Recognizing that many schools are unable to protect their students from violence and bullying,

Acknowledging the fact that not all people are getting fair education and that the digital and technological programs can help with that;

Aware that we need improvements in the digital area and that many people do not get access to education,

Understanding that communities should fund the transport to school and educational technology to promote more accessible learning,

Affordable Education

1. Declares accordingly for a more affordable education;
2. Calls upon countries to share money to support students in rural areas;
3. Advises countries to launch a 5 year fund to encourage teachers to teach democracy;
4. Encourages increased funding for protection around all schools;
5. Calls upon all member states to increase the funding for rural schools from the government;
6. Advises the government to get more affordable resources;
7. Encourages all people to donate to schools

Improvement of Curriculum Education

8. Requests schools to implement democratic lessons into these school systems;
9. Encourages students to share their cultural background;
10. Urges schools to teach parents and students about human rights;
11. Introduces safer practices in schools such as fire drills, etc. to keep children away from danger;
12. Calls for schools to spend their budget on higher quality teacher training and school materials;
13. Encourages schools to join the MMUN program;
14. Suggests to build more schools in rural areas;

Education through Technology

15. Calls upon all countries to invest in school technology to support children attending school;
16. Strongly encourages more affordable educational programs;
17. Further invites the governments of all countries to create online learning sites for high school interns;

Access in Education

18. Calls for funding vehicles to send children to school;
19. Further requests more accessibility for disabled people in schools;
20. Encourages all nations to allow children to get free transportation only for school;

21. Further requests the government to allow further implementation of technology in schools to help the disabled (example, construct slopes, automatic doors, etc.).
