Topic: Refugee and migrant health

Recognizing the lack of language friendly hospitals,

Alarmed by the amount of migrants unable to healthcare due to the communication barriers with healthcare professionals,

Stressing the need for all doctors to learn all forms of medical equipment,

Noting with regret that many refugees and migrants are without proper healthcare,

Fully aware of the amount of refugees and migrants leaving their countries,

Keeping in mind the lack of mental and psychological support,

Encouraging financial support for refugee and migrant healthcare,

Emphasizing that healthcare and education is expensive,

Bearing in mind migrants cant get jobs because they cant speak local languages,

Taking notes that NGOs aren't getting enough money to give out,

Healthcare Access and Medical Support

1. Encourages the building of a program where people donate money to buy resources for refugees and migrants;
2. Supports doctors willing to help refugees and migrants;

3. Further requests the building of refugee shelters in areas in need of support;
4. Requests that staff especially medical professionals are trained to deal with the unique mental health needs of refugees and migrants;
5. Endorses possible solutions for refugees and migrants like expanding literacy and implementing supportive policies like health insurances;
6. Supports the solution of creating accessible healthcare systems;
7. Endorses that trained doctors are sent to conflict areas to provide health support;

Education of Translation and Healthcare

8. Introduces free online or in person or any other classes to teach people speaking other languages the local language;
9. Considers establishing bilingual medical schools for refugees and migrants;
10. Considers in person healthcare services that are run by experienced doctors;
11. Encourages hiring more bilingual doctors to communicate with refugees and migrants;
12. Urges educators that work with refugees and migrants to be bilingual;
13. Endorses medical campaigns to improve refugee and migrant health;
14. Further recommends member states to adopt Universal Healthcare;

Partnerships with the UN

15. Encourages all member states to donate to refugees and migrants;
16. Calls upon the UN to make a first aid learning facility;
17. Invites the UN and all member states to help find shelters that are free for refugees and migrants;
18. Further invites the UN to make donation boxes to be placed around the city;
19. Further recommends all member states to create a food drive system that is free for refugees and migrants;
20. Calls for member states to create a bus system that can take refugees and migrants to a safe place or shelters;

Funding and Financial Support

21. Encourages the government to give jobs to migrants and refugees;
22. welcomes fundraisers for healthcare;

23. Urges peacekeepers to stop discrimination ;
24. Encourages donations for migrants and refugees;
25. Emphasizes adding campaigns;
26. Calls upon member states to consider imposing .25% of taxes paid to go to health and education;
27. Advises the UN to deliver supplies for migrants and refugees.
