Topic : Children in Armed Conflicts

Acknowledging that most nations do not have humanitarian aid,

Acknowledging the problem of children in armed conflict by making laws and signing multiple documents,

Deeply concerned that many children in armed conflict do not have safe zones,

Approving the United Nations creation of the office of the special representative of the security general to promote the protection of children in armed conflict,

Keeping in mind the number of child casualties globally in armed conflicts,

Recognizing the lack of access to education within conflict areas,

Preventing Recruitment

- I. Calls for the creation of a fund to protect children from recruitment into wars and conflicts;

2. Suggests prohibiting the recruitment of children into armed conflicts below 16 years old;
3. Strongly encourages the elimination of forced labour of a child;
4. Proposes that member states and international organizations lessen the pressure on children to join army groups within peacetime;
5. Endorses the education of children to inform them of their rights so army recruiters can't easily take advantage of them;

Safe Zones

1. Recommends that member states should implement more safe zones;
2. Encourages all nations to implement better transport to safe zones;
3. Invites other countries to make programs for reintegration of children;
4. Recommends implementing easier access to safe zones;
5. Encourages volunteers and businesses to take part in the construction, improvement, and maintenance of safe zones;

Children's Rights

6. Invites all nations to optionally increase the sanctions of human rights violators;
7. Emphasizes the increased funding for the prevention of further violations of children's rights, by investing in search and rescue missions and humanitarian aid facilities;

Direction of Monetary Funds

8. Emphasizes the increased funding for the prevention of further violations of children's rights, by investing in search and rescue missions and humanitarian aid facilities;
9. Encourages all nations to invest in building and maintaining safe zones in active areas of conflict;
10. Recommends the standardization of optional self defense courses in schools globally;
11. Endorses the funding of international education on the topic of children in armed conflict;
12. Reaffirms the safety protection of hospitals, schools, and other civilian infrastructures under global humanitarian laws;
13. Urges the distribution of all basic necessities for children in armed conflict;
14. Advises to fund easily accessible programs that help with topics like mental health, displacement from countries, and reuniting with native countries and children that are separated from their parents/legal guardians.
