Topic: Children and Armed Conflict

Considering the children in armed conflict that have no safe place to go,

Alarmed by the lack of healthcare for children in many areas of armed conflict,

Deeply Concerned about the lack of registered people,

Acknowledging the large amount of children exploited by large armed groups,

Taking note to educate children of their rights,

Alarmed by their lack of children's knowledge of their human rights,

Acknowledges that funding for rehabilitation would let children get over the stress and trauma of wars,

Noting further that violations of human rights effects are a serious matter,

Fully aware of the mental and physical tolls this takes on children,

Safe Community Spaces

1. Emphasizes the trauma caused in armed conflict, children in armed conflict should get free healthcare and therapy resources;
2. Calls for safe houses and therapy;
3. Calls upon charities to get food for children;
4. Notes the importance of opening escape paths for emergencies;
5. Encourages the importance of a monitored, safe, and designated space for children;
6. Encourages access to healthcare for all children;
7. Draws the attention to have non-permanent orphanages for children who lost their parents;
8. Recommends safe houses for children to go to during wars,

Prevention of Child Exploitation

9. Invites governments to help expand birth registration through UNICEF;
10. Encourages countries to enforce laws against the use of child soldiers;
11. Urges countries to use Argentina's 102 helpline model;
12. Acknowledges the Mericenters work and advises governments to use their work;
13. Calls for regional discussions about the status of children;
14. Recommends there should be an agency that prosecutes the culprits of committing grave violations against children in armed conflict;

Protection and Supply of Education for Children

15. Acknowledges that re-using buildings could protect children while they learn;
16. Encourages raising money to build schools;
17. Further invites countries to educate children on their rights;
18. Endorses spreading education across the globe;
19. Encourages countries to work together to make sure their children stay safe from armed countries

Supporting Children and Reintegration

20. Urges that all families head home once it is confirmed to be safe in the areas they once lived;
21. Strongly encourages for children to be provided with safe spaces;
22. Requests funding for children to be provided with safe spaces;
23. Recommend that all countries work together to train therapists to help children recover after wars;
24. Encourages the needs for healthcare during armed conflicts.
