Topic: The Human rights of migrants

Fully aware that migrants and refugees often lack the freedom of religion,

Suggesting lower prices so migrants and refugees can afford food & transportation,

Acknowledging that the human rights of migrants are being violated and their needs are not being met,

Deeply concerned that refugees and migrants lack the healthcare that they need,

Recognizing the importance of the influence of limited resources on basic human rights,

Realizing how basic rights and freedoms affect migrants,

Emphasizing that children need a proper education to thrive,

Keeping in mind that most migrants and refugees are underpaid for working hard jobs,

Basic Needs of Refugees and Migrants and Freedom of Religion

1. Further recommends 1% of taxpayer taxes go to funds for migrant school and hospitals;
2. Introduces the creation of an organization where migrants and refugees can get a job so they can pay for basic human rights such as food, water, healthcare, and shelter;
3. Hopes for an educational summit for migrant children ten and older where they could learn about different cultures and what's going on in the world;
4. Proclaims all humanity to have a choice to pick their religion;
5. Appeals that migrants and refugees deserve easy travel and fair education;
6. Invites countries to consider the impact of climate change on migrants;
7. Encourages countries to flip migrants' money into their new country's money;

Housing, Healthcare, Nutrition

8. Calls for the establishment of migrant-friendly currency exchange services near borders so migrants can access local currency and afford their basic needs;
9. Also calls for migrants to have access to healthcare within their first year of migrating to a country, as well as mental health checks before providing medication;
10. Further recommends that the prices of shelters in low migration countries be lowered to make them more accessible for migrants and encourage migration flow away from unstable nations;
11. Strongly encourages that appropriate nutrition be provided to migrants in need;
12. Further proclaims that the seven most advanced economies of the world (the G7); should donate 2% of their GDP so migrants can have access to universal healthcare;
13. Recommends finding a donation driver applied to furniture and home goods;

Support and Equal Basic Human Rights for All

14. Encourages funding international organizations to provide needs to migrants with United Nations transport trucks;
15. Urges people to reduce gender inequality, racism, and promote zero discrimination of different people so every migrant gets the same working fees and treatment;
16. Further recommends major migration countries to use appropriate amounts of taxpayer funds rather than money from their international budgets while the rest of the needed money is either funded or given by the UN;
17. Suggests building more Temporary Migration Reception Stations near major migration countries;

18. Suggesting that multiple worldwide travel areas be made, helping reduce border disputes and migration struggles;
19. Requests anti-human trafficking training for all workers in migration stations;
20. Also urges for low-cost language devices that will allow migrants from everywhere communicate easily;

Quality Education, Transportation, Jobs, and Money

21. Urges people to refrain from discrimination against migrants in workplaces, transportation, and education;
22. Instructs student peers to support migrants and refugees in education;
23. Calls for a study and scholarship program for migrants and refugees;
24. Encourages community fundraising for migrant's support;
25. Suggests local internships for migrants when they first arrive in a country;
26. Underlines the need to give migrants necessities under the condition that they contribute back to the community;
27. Strongly encourages affordable buses that transport migrants to safe spaces.
