Topic: Refugee and Migrant Health

Deeply concerned by the low quality of housing in refugee camps around the world,

Bearing in mind the overpopulation of camps leading to a quicker spread of sicknesses and lowering hygiene standards,

Noting with deep concern refugees and migrants are all around the world with nowhere to stay,

Acknowledging that immigrants need quick access to good healthcare in the countries,

Noting with concern that refugees and migrants don't have accessible healthcare,

Acknowledging cities modern money struggles, lots of cities can't afford citizens healthcare, much less refugees,

Noting with deep concern that when refugees and migrants enter a new country they don't always have the best health, and there's not always something they can do about it,

Fully aware that migrants can refugees often experience trauma on the way to a new country,

Globally Repairing and building Refugee Camps and Helping the Refugees Inside of Them

1. Calls for the UN to provide housing and funds for all refugees and migrants until they are making a steady income;
2. Suggests that the UN provide each refugee/migrant a centre to help them settle in and get a job if they are struggling with things like drug addiction or mental issues;
3. Instructs the UN to find out which countries refugees and migrants are most prominent in and set up information stands near borders for them so that they can find out information like where to live;
4. Requests that all refugee housing areas provide proper nutrition and meals to all that live there;

Internationally Accessible Economics and Healthcare

5. Notes with satisfaction that the WHO supports refugees and migrants health;
6. Urges countries to share the best practices and collaborate across borders to address risks, discrimination, and healthcare access barriers;
7. Encourages countries to provide health programs for migrants including checks, vaccinations, mental health and travel aid. With the help of WHO, we can set standards so refugees and migrants can access health rights;
8. Encourages countries to increase the healthcare standard for everyone and language education systems;
9. Further recommends to help make less refugees is that the UN can give funds and necessities, so that citizens do not feel the need to leave their country;
10. Recommends that hospitals hire bilingual staff so that refugees and immigrants can communicate their symptoms;
11. Encourages countries to build more hospitals and healthcare centers to make healthcare more accessible for refugees everywhere;

Affordable Accessible Healthcare for All and Hospital Expansion

12. Requests that more clinics are built by the UN, where there are less hospitals, for migrants and refugees;
13. Advises that more UN volunteers are hired to build more clinics in refugee camps;
14. Calls for governments, if able, to put more money into healthcare for refugees;
15. Directs people to donate money into a healthcare for refugees and migrants;
16. Acknowledges that hospitals should allow more loans from citizens and especially refugees and migrants;

Physical and Mental Health of Refugees and Migrants Everywhere

17. Calls for medical professionals that are trained for foreign patients;
18. Draws the attention of refugee and migrant camps to make the occupants feel safe, comfortable, and at home;
19. Emphasizes the opportunity for different ethnic groups to room in different shelters;
20. Calls upon the UN to find schools for mentally challenged Refugee children;
21. Instructs doctors to learn the most common migrant languages to assist better;
22. Invites migrants and refugees to come looking for physical and mental health facilities without fear;
23. Requests that all countries in the UN have a place for immigrants.
