Topic: Empowering Youth in Inclusive and Sustainable Food Systems

Deeply concerned by how harmful overproduced products can be for the human body and realizing that we need to promote healthy plant-based foods,

Recognizing that a skilled farmer is made through education, empowerment, and experience,

Highly alarmed by the decline of youth interest in agriculture,

Recognizing that the role of educational institutions in educating children on the importance of sustainable food systems is a big step to solving food poverty,

Recalling the mission of the United Nations to promote sustainable development and eradicate poverty,

Fully alarmed by the amount of plastics in overprocessed foods which make them more harmful for the human body,

Emphasizing the importance of technology in sustainable food systems,

Approving prioritized expansion of youth access to land and financial resources, including low interest loans, grants and seed funding,

Emphasizing equal access to education and employment for rural youth,

Youth Farming and Sustainable Agriculture

1. Encourages governments to promote healthier and more sustainable food production systems through education and training programs for farmers;
2. Requests the national youth chapter of the World Food Forum to strengthen youth leadership in policy and innovation;
3. Calls upon member states to invest and empower youth in climate-resilient, innovative, and sustainable agriculture initiatives;
4. Further recommends member states to slow down the meat industry and focus on more plant-based foods condemning the reliance on ultra processed food in global diets;
5. Recommends member states to add greenhouses in schools to reaffirm agricultural interest in cities where it is not prevalent;

6. Calls upon governments to establish youth agricultural training centers and provide agricultural workshops that provide instruction in sustainable farming;
7. Further reminds other nations to educate children in sustainable food systems and how to take action against poverty sooner;
8. Requests regular monitoring and reporting on the progress of programs aimed at supporting youth in agricultural organizations;
9. Encourages public awareness campaigns to improve perceptions of agriculture as a modern and profitable career path;
10. Expresses its desire to address the problem of weak food systems as it strengthens resilience and economic stability;

11. Recommends other nations to invest in modern harvesting technology;
12. Calls upon the supermarkets around the globe to sell ugly produce to help reduce global food waste;

Engaging Youth in Employment and Reducing Discrimination in Rural Areas

13. Calls for building capacities for youth through vocational training building, agritech skills development, mentorship, and partnerships with universities, and innovation hubs as essential;
14. Encourages investment in educational and employment programs for youth in rural communities;
15. Welcomes institutionalizing youth participation through advisory councils, in multi-stakeholder platforms, to ensure their voices are integrated into policies;
16. Recommends rural awareness campaigns.
